



- Construction Start Q1 2022!




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Typical Cross Section





Bush Stadium: home to the Indianapolis Indians from 1931 to 1996, also home to a few Negro League baseball teams, as well as a Continental Football League team, the Indianapolis Capitols, who won the league's final championship in 1969.

Indianapolis Clowns in Riverside Park: "One of the posters shown in the book: "Baseball Circus" 42nd season Indianapolis Clowns vs Lasers at Riverside Park features Miss Lucy Miller Lady Umpire. Hank Aaron once played for the Clowns."

The Founding Story of Riverside Park

The outskirts of Indianapolis in the early 1800s

North Indianapolis annexed in 1895

First roads in Riverside "Roache"

Riverside as an intersection of waterways, greenways, and motor transportation

White River & Central Canal used for early transportation

Riverside area used as farmland during early European settlement

Beltline Railroad (1878)

Interurban electric railway (1900)

The bus turnaround in what is now the Riverside triangle

Intersection of trails: White River Greenway, Canal Towpath

Riverside Amusement Park as the first major destination (1903)

Riverside Historic Landmarks

Five nationally-registered historic places:

Thomas Taggart Riverside Park Memorial

The Naval Armory (now Riverside High School)

Riverside United Methodist Church

Public School 44

29th Street Bridge









A Historically Multicultural Region

The White River & Indigenous Groups of the Midwest

Native American tribes of Indiana: Potawatomi, Shawnee, Kickapoo, Delaware, Winnebago, Wea, Wyandotte, Ottawa, Chippewa, Menominee, Fox, Sauk

Indian Removal Acts - Forced Relocation

Early European Settlement: German, Irish, Polish, Slovenian, Greek, Hungarian, Turkish

Immigrant exodus to a better life

German or Irish street names

Immigrant-Americans and African Americans in Regional Riverside area built communities that contributed to the City's economy; started businesses, clubs, saloons, groceries, restaurants. Indiana Ave nearby and thriving cultural mecca of the mid-1800s to the 1950s

Growing Latino population















Dignity & Freedom

Segregation of Indianapolis' public facilities (and parks system) intensified in the late-1910s, KKK intensified in 1915 corresponding to the rise of the Indiana Ku Klux Klan after 1915.

Segregation of the Riverside Amusement Park from 1919-1960s...

"Colored Frolic Day." To the black community, the day became known as "milk cap day," because each person had to offer up a milk cap to gain entrance.

The lynching of George Tompkins at Cold Spring woods, near Municipal Gardens, in 1922. Potentially other lynchings in Riverside Park during Jim Crow era

NAACP youth picket outside Riverside Amusement Park in 1962

Schools in Indiana began segregating formally in the late 1920s and early 1930s

Segregated bathing beaches and golf courses in Riverside


White flight post-Civil Rights Act, resulting in disinvestment

Construction of I-65 and I-70 in 1975-1976

The anti-interstate movement, Boniface Hardin, protests
